7 8 9 10	<b>WHEREAS</b> , since being elected in 2010, Senator Ron Johnson has been a vocal leader in defense of conservative principles, in providing government oversight, fighting for small business owners, finding consensus on healthcare and opioid-abuse issues, improving border security and national security in general, and highlighting our long-term fiscal concerns; and,
11 12 13 14	<b>WHEREAS</b> , Senator Johnson has taken up the mantle of investigating numerous topics of interest to the American people, including the safety and efficacy of Covid-19 vaccines, or lack thereof, and the benefits of alternative treatments, when others in Congress, the administration, and the media have failed to do so; and,

22	<b>EDUCATION</b>
23 24	2023 – 02 EDUCATION: SCHOOL FUNDING TO FOLLOW THE STUDENT
25 26	<b>WHEREAS</b> , funding for "Choice Students" is just over \$8,000 per student vs near \$15,000 for public school students; and,
27 28	<b>WHEREAS</b> , there is a significant variance in the performance of government schools, with some performing with excellence and others performing poorly; and,
29 30 31	<b>WHEREAS</b> , Democrats and teachers' unions continue to fight against the ability of parents to utilize designated funds to provide a quality education for their children or to move their children to different public schools from those designated based on residential location; and,
32 33 34	<b>WHEREAS</b> , private schools and homeschools often provide superior educational opportunities for less than the cost of public schools, and the movement of students from public to private or homeschooling may result in a net savings to taxpayers while improving outcomes.
35 36 37 38	<b>NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED</b> , that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in Caucus, demands that elected leaders cease forcing our students into failing schools and may directly allocate funds to students to cover expenses of the education of the parents' choice; be it public, private, or homeschool.

#### 1 2023 - 03 CRITICAL RACE THEORY

- 2 WHEREAS, Critical Race Theory, an academic discipline rooted in Marxism, falsely posits that
- 3 the United States is an institutionally racist nation, and that racism is ingrained in every aspect of
- 4 American society; and
- 5 **WHEREAS**, proponents of critical race theory believe that the solution to what they determine to
- 6 be "institutional racism" in the United States is to dismantle and recreate all American institutions;
- 7 and
- 8 WHEREAS, Critical Race Theory's tenets are fundamentally racist in that they suggest that
- 9 people should be viewed and treated differently based on the color of their skin; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Critical Race Theory divides Americans and promotes racial tensions and is
- becoming increasingly prevalent in schools across the country.
- 12 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that The Republican Party of Wisconsin in Caucus
- assembled, urges support for banning Critical Race Theory teaching and practice from future
- 14 educational models in Wisconsin schools.

#### 16 <u>2023 - 04</u> <u>DRAG IN SCHOOLS OR LIBRARIES</u>

- 17 WHEREAS, the purpose of our society's schools and libraries is to offer them learning
- opportunities and to teach the basics like reading, writing, math, and sciences to our children to
- 19 help them become productive members of our society; and,
- 20 WHEREAS, from the beginning of time, parents alone have chosen what ethics and morals to
- 21 teach their kids; and.
- WHEREAS, the purpose of such readings is to convince small children to accept the behavior of
- 23 people whose lifestyles are counter intuitive to the morals and ethics of their parents and the
- 24 majority; and,
- 25 **WHEREAS**, such behavior by these adults is considered grooming behavior; and,
- 26 WHEREAS, the way to include the LGBTQ community in our society has nothing to do with
- 27 giving them access to grooming society's children,
- NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
- assembled, demands Wisconsin's State Legislators and Legislative leaders, work together to pass
- 30 legislation to prevent outside people or groups from providing "readers," or also Drag Queens
- 31 whose morals deviate from the public at large; and,
- 32 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that any publicly funded agency or organization who ignores
- such legislation does so at the threat of loss of public funding; and,

#### 35 <u>2023 - 05</u> <u>RESOLUTION ON REDUCING SEXUALIZING YOUNG CHILDREN IN</u>

#### 36 **PUBLIC SCHOOLS**

- 37 WHEREAS, it has been increasingly doubtful that public schools can properly police Sexual
- 38 Predators within their ranks, and that increasingly individuals within the system foster sexual
- discourse to kindergarten, and 1st through 4th grade Students to influence their decision making.

- 1 WHEREAS, Florida's Parental Rights in Education legislation, which prohibits public schools
- 2 from teaching gender identity and sexual orientation in kindergarten through third grade was
- 3 recently passed.
- 4 WHEREAS, A 2004 report from the U.S. Department of Education estimated that around one in
- 5 ten public school students will experience educator sexual misconduct by the time they graduate
- 6 from high school. The Department of Education should update the report as soon as possible to
- 7 allow current data to be analyzed.
- 8 WHEREAS, A "2000 survey, conducted by the American Association of University Women, of
- 9 2,065 students in grades 8 through 11 (showed)—that nearly 10 percent of K-12 students have
- been victims of sexual misconduct by a Public-School employee. Assuming that figure is accurate,
- 11 this would translate into an approximately 4.5 million children nationwide suffering sexual
- misconduct by public school employees, with an estimated 3 million suffering physical sexual
- abuse, a number, according to the author of the study, (a) Hofstra University professor.... more
- than 100 times greater than the physical abuse committed by Catholic priests".,
- 15 WHEREAS, A separate study on sexual allegations was conducted on the third largest school
- district in Chicago, with 400,00 public school students. "A shocking report released on Jan. 1 by
- the Office of the Inspector General (OIG) at Chicago Public Schools received 447 allegations of
- adult-on-student sexual misconduct in 2022, ranging from inappropriate touching to sexual abuse."
- A prevalent feature of these crimes is in the demonstrated in the length of 'protection' afforded
- when these crimes occur. A physical education teacher sent pornographic videos of his genital area
- 21 to an 11th grade female student The student reported the incident to two other staff members within
- 22 days of the occurrence. However, the two staff members "made excuses for the teacher," according
- 23 to the report. "One of them said that the conduct was probably unintentional and that he did not
- believe the teacher would sexually harass a student because he had a daughter of his own.". "The
- other staff member blamed the student for wearing provocative clothing, implying that she brought
- the problem on herself."
- 27 WHEREAS, Sexual Predators were protected by the Loudoun County Public School's Board. The
- 28 investigation into the boards' bungled response to two sexual assaults, "has so far led to two
- 29 indictments and the firing of schools Superintendent Scott Ziegler. But those were by no means
- 30 the only examples of sexual violence being mishandled in the county's schools.
- 31 WHEREAS, in another study of the Chicago School District a conclusion that these crimes go
- 32 under reported. "That According to the Office of Inspector General report stated that many of the
- 33 470 sexual misconduct cases it opened in 2022 "would not be addressed at all in other school
- districts, or would be triaged to school staff or administrators, The report cites several examples of
- sexual misconduct cases in 2022. There were 81 allegations classified as "touching, less than
- sexual abuse"; 35 identified as "grooming"; 33 allegations labeled as "sexual abuse." There were
- 37 243 allegations labeled as "concerning." In its four years, the unit has opened 1,735 cases of sexual
- 213 unegations inserted as concerning. In its total years, the unit has opened 1,733 cases of sexual
- 38 misconduct." The report stated at least 16 criminal charges have been filed against school-district
- 39 affiliated adults for sex-related crimes by prosecutors. An average of 4 prosecutions a year.
- 40 NOW THERE OF BE IT RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
- 41 assembled fully supports implementation of laws protecting children from the 'preparation' of
- 42 Students toward sexuality below the 5<sup>th</sup> grade.

- 1 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled
- 2 urges that laws and funds be devoted to the identification and removal of sexual predators within
- 3 the Public-School Districts of Wisconsin by a force outside of the control of DPI and local school
- 4 boards, and prosecution of these crimes by local DA's made regularly. That Unions shall not be
- 5 permitted to negotiate or fund on behalf of those individuals that have been proven to be involved
- 6 in sexual misconduct with students.
- 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled
- 8 urges that the State of Wisconsin should participate in requiring applicants to disclose information
- 9 regarding investigations or disciplinary actions related to sexual abuse or misconduct, and in turn
- make all allegations to be reported to the DPI to be tracked, and available to other States and
- 11 School Districts. Any proven history of sexual abuse should automatically disqualify one from
- working in any institution where minor children are present.

#### 2023 - 06 PROTECTION OF FEMALE SPORTS

- 15 WHEREAS, the purpose of women's or young ladies' sports programs are to offer a fun
- environment for young ladies to learn about fair competition and the social and emotional benefits
- of competing with those of their own biological gender, size, and class; and,
- WHEREAS, from the beginning of sports programs, in general, there have been biological gender
- specific, size and class differentiated sports programs, and such programs keep elementary school
- 20 football teams from having to compete with college football teams; and,
- 21 WHEREAS, it has never been the purpose of female sports to offer psychological aid to the
- biological males who are the gender dysphoric among us as they deal with the unfortunate
- 23 condition, they find themselves in, and;
- 24 WHEREAS, publicly funded sports programs should not become ethical dumping grounds all in
- 25 the politically correct name of inclusion; and let us start including the wishes of the majority
- 26 participating in any female sports, and;
- 27 WHEREAS, there is nothing that precludes sports organizations who cater to people born
- 28 biological males from having or organizing and getting public funding for those programs catering
- 29 to biological males' sports.
- 30 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
- 31 assembled, demands Wisconsin's State Legislators and Legislative leaders, work together to pass
- 32 legislation that prohibits any publicly funded organizations from allowing biological males from
- 33 participating in any female's sports programs, and denies public funding for any such
- 34 organizations; and,

#### 2023 - 07 PROTECT SCHOOLS – TRAIN/ARM TEACHERS

- 37 WHEREAS, the state, parents and school personnel have a vested interest in the protection of
- 38 themselves and our children; and,
- 39 WHEREAS, our second amendment is specific about the right to bear arms not being infringed,
- and makes no mention of a right of government to infringe on people's rights based on location;
- 41 and,

- WHEREAS, it is a good idea to protect our children with teachers licensed for CCW, with firing range time and training, recorded with and indemnified by the district; and,
- 3 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
- 4 assembled, demands Wisconsin's State Legislators and Legislative leaders, work together to pass
- 5 legislation that reflects the teachers right to self-protection, affirming our desire to protect our
- 6 children and showing our resolve to have safe schools.

- 2023 08 RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF PROTECTING FREEDOM OF SPEECH, THOUGHT, AND EXPRESSION AT INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION
- 11 WHEREAS, the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States guarantees that
- "Congress shall make no law . . . abridging the freedom of speech"; and
- 13 WHEREAS, in Healy v. James, 408 U.S. 169 (1972), the Supreme Court of the United States held
- 14 that the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States applies in full force on the
- campuses of public colleges and universities; and
- WHEREAS, in Widmar v. Vincent, 454 U.S. 263 (1981), the Supreme Court of the United States
- observed that "the campus of a public university, at least for its students, possesses many of the
- 18 characteristics of a public forum"; and
- 19 WHEREAS, lower Federal courts have also held that the open, outdoor areas of the campuses of
- 20 public colleges and universities are public forums; and
- 21 **WHEREAS**, section 112(a)(2) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1011a(a)(2))
- 22 contains a sense of Congress noting that "an institution of higher education should facilitate the
- 23 free and open exchange of ideas", "students should not be intimidated, harassed, discouraged from
- speaking out, or discriminated against", "students should be treated equally and fairly", and
- 25 "nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to modify, change, or infringe upon any
- 26 constitutionally protected religious liberty, freedom, expression, or association"; and
- 27 WHEREAS, despite the clarity of the applicable legal precedent and the vital importance of
- protecting public colleges in the United States as true "marketplaces of ideas", the Foundation for
- 29 Individual Rights in Education has found that approximately 1 in 10 of the top colleges and
- universities in the United States quarantine student expression to so-called "free speech zones",
- and a survey of 466 schools found that almost 30 percent maintain severely restrictive speech
- 32 codes that clearly and substantially prohibit constitutionally protected speech; and
- 33 WHEREAS, according to the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), "Speech codes adopted
- 34 by government-financed state colleges and universities amount to government censorship, in
- violation of the Constitution. And the ACLU believes that all campuses should adhere to First
- 36 Amendment principles because academic freedom is a bedrock of education in a free society.";
- 37 and
- 38 WHEREAS, the University of Chicago, as part of its commitment "to free and open inquiry in all
- matters", in 2015 issued a statement in which "it guarantees all members of the University
- 40 community the broadest possible latitude to speak, write, listen, challenge, and learn", and 78
- 41 university administrations and faculty bodies (including the University of Wisconsin System, when

- 1 in October, 2017 the Board of Regents adopted Regent Policy Document 4-21) have endorsed a
- 2 version of the "Chicago Statement"; and
- 3 WHEREAS, the States of Virginia, Missouri, Arizona, Kentucky, Colorado, Utah, North Carolina,
- 4 Tennessee, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, South Dakota, and Iowa (and others) have passed
- 5 legislation prohibiting public colleges and universities from quarantining expressive activities on
- 6 the open outdoor areas of campuses to misleadingly labeled free speech zones; and
- 7 WHEREAS, free speech zones have been used to restrict political speech from all parts of the
- 8 political spectrum and have thus inhibited the free exchange of ideas at campuses across the
- 9 country; and
- 10 WHEREAS, restrictions on the free exchange of ideas and opinions on Wisconsin college
- campuses diminish the ability of students to develop critical thinking skills that are the primary
- 12 goals of higher education, thus devaluing the quality of education underwritten by Wisconsin
- taxpayers and tuition payers; now, therefore, be it
- 14 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin District, in caucus assembled, recognizes
- that free speech zones and restrictive speech codes are inherently at odds with the freedom of
- speech guaranteed by the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; and be it
- 17 further,
- 18 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, recognizes that
- 19 institutions of higher education should facilitate and recommit themselves to protecting the free
- and open exchange of ideas; and be it further,
- 21 RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin District Recognizes that freedom of
- 22 expression and freedom of speech are sacred ideals of the United States that must be vigorously
- safeguarded in a world increasingly hostile to our Republic; and be it further,
- 24 RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, encourages the
- Wisconsin State legislature to adopt legislation like that in other States, prohibiting Wisconsin
- 26 public colleges and universities from quarantining expressive activities on the open outdoor areas
- of campuses to misleadingly labeled free speech zones; and be it further,
- 28 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, encourages the
- 29 President of the University of Wisconsin (UW) System to enforce the action items already
- 30 specified in Regent Policy Document 4-21 (Commitment to Academic Freedom and Freedom of
- 31 Expression), and to promote policies that foster spirited debate, academic freedom, intellectual
- 32 curiosity, and viewpoint diversity on the campuses of the UW System; and be it further,
- 33 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, recognizes that many
- of the restrictions of free speech on UW System campuses result directly from a lack of intellectual
- and/or viewpoint diversity among faculty and administrators, and therefore encourages the
- President of the UW System to appoint a commission to inquire into that lack and its impact on
- 37 the quality of education at UW System institutions; and now, therefore,
- 38 **BE IT RESOLVED** that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, encourages the
- 39 Wisconsin Attorney General to defend and protect the First Amendment on Wisconsin colleges
- 40 and Universities.

#### 2023 - 09 SECURE OUR ELECTIONS

- 4 WHEREAS, Democrat controlled federal agencies such as the FBI have colluded with US based
- 5 international tech companies to interfere in our elections, and
- 6 WHEREAS, managing elections is a state responsibly, not a federal responsibility, and
- 7 WHEREAS, the findings of both the Gableman and Legislative Audit Bureau investigations of
- 8 the 2020 election have raised serious doubts about the integrity of Wisconsin's elections, and
- 9 WHEREAS, The Democrat Party has been using outside money to administer elections and to
- 10 engage in ballot harvesting in counties that it controls, and
- 11 WHEREAS, Wisconsin's most populous Democrat governed counties and municipalities refuse
- 12 to enforce election law, leaving their jurisdictions rife with illegal vote harvesting and voter
- 13 registration fraud, and
- 14 WHEREAS, counties and municipalities that are unable to control crime, from homicide to
- shoplifting, lack both the will and the means to stop illegal vote harvesting, and
- NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus assembled:
- calls the Wisconsin legislature to formally censure the federal administration for violating
  Wisconsin sovereignty by interfering in its elections, and
  - 2. declares that the only way to restore faith in our elections in the face of so many well-financed, creative vote harvesting operations is to return to same-day, in-person voting with the only exceptions being absentee ballots issued only for cause, and
- 23 3. calls the WEC to require those now termed "indefinitely confined" to simply use the
  24 absentee ballot procedure, and
  - 4. calls on the State Legislature to outlaw outside funding to counties and municipalities" for election administration and staffing and,
  - 5. calls on our counties to continue to use paper ballots counted by simple voting tabulators with no Wi-Fi modems or internet capability, or requests that voting machines be eliminated and all ballots be counted by hand, and
- 6. calls on municipal clerks to delete voter registrations of all inactive voters every four years,and
- 7. calls on the state registrar's office to automatically update voter registration rolls whenever
  it receives death certificate notification, and
- 8. calls on County District Attorneys who have jurisdiction to prosecute election fraud in
  adjoining counties, and
- 9. calls on the legislative leadership of the Assembly to articulate and implement a plan to use its considerable power of the purse to encourage all municipalities to enforce election law.

#### 1 <u>2023 - 10</u> <u>ELIMINATION OF WEC AND E.R.I.C.</u>

- 2 WHEREAS, free and fair elections are the cornerstone of the American Republic; and,
- 3 WHEREAS, since the 2020 Spring election (and before), election laws of Wisconsin were allowed
- 4 to be violated by directives of the Commissioners of the Wisconsin Elections Commission (WEC);
- 5 and,
- 6 WHEREAS, WEC also directed certain counties to use illegal drop boxes for ballots, promoted
- 7 improper registration requirements for absentee ballots, and allowed ballot harvesting; which were
- 8 all prohibited by Wisconsin law; and,
- 9 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin has experienced the WEC involvement in our elections since June 30,
- 2016, and the inclusion of the Electronic Registration Information Center (E.R.I.C.) since 2012,
- and whereas we believe that both systems have not been beneficial to the citizens of Wisconsin;
- 12 and,
- 13 WHEREAS, it appears that another layer of bureaucracy has been placed between the citizens and
- 14 their government by the establishment of the WEC; and
- WHEREAS, easy access to our voter information, as well as our private DL# and SS#, by
- unknown actors has been documented to have occurred due to Wisconsin's having joined the
- 17 E.R.I.C., and,
- 18 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
- 19 assembled, hereby calls upon the Governor and Wisconsin's State Assembly and Senate to
- 20 eliminate the WEC, dissolve any contract with E.R.I.C., investigate the use of alternative service
- such as Omega4America; and,
- 22 **BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, the Republican Party of Wisconsin requires the state legislature
- 23 resume their rightful and constitutional duties to certify electors, as identified in Wisconsin law
- and the U.S. Constitution Article II, section 4, clause 1, and that they never again delegate their
- 25 full authority to administrate elections as required by law to another organizational entity.

#### 2023 – 11 WISCONSIN ELECTION ADMINISTRATION

- WHEREAS, millions of dollars in private funds have been donated to Wisconsin municipalities
- 29 by Center for Tech and Civic Life (CTCL) and other private groups since 2020, for the purpose of
- 30 manipulating the outcome of Wisconsin election administration; and,
- 31 WHEREAS, according to the reports issued by the Gableman investigation and the Assembly
- 32 Elections Committee hearings, the infusion of private money into Wisconsin elections has changed
- 33 the outcome of these elections; and,
- 34 WHEREAS, the City of Madison again this year accepted an additional \$1.5 million dollars in
- 35 private funding to administer elections, and the City of Milwaukee, other Wisconsin cities and the
- 36 Wisconsin University System have accepted or are currently considering approval of similar
- 37 donations; and,
- 38 WHEREAS, the Governor has vetoed legislation banning the use of private funds in the
- 39 administration of Wisconsin's elections; and,

- 1 WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Constitution can be amended without the Governor's signature by
- 2 both the Assembly and Senate passing a resolution in two consecutive sessions and then putting
- 3 the resolution on the ballot for the people of Wisconsin to approve; and,
- 4 WHEREAS, in the last legislative session, the Wisconsin Assembly and the Wisconsin Senate
- 5 passed a resolution to amend the Wisconsin Constitution to ban the use of private funds in
- 6 Wisconsin's elections; and,
- 7 **WHEREAS**, this resolution was not re-introduced in the initial 2023 Legislative session, meaning
- 8 it would not appear on the April ballot; and,
- 9 WHEREAS, a recent grassroots survey of Republican voters showed over 85% would vote in
- 10 favor of said constitutional amendment;
- 11 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus
- 12 assembled, demands that the State Legislature protect our constitutional right to have our
- individual votes fully and properly counted in every election and ban the illegal influence of
- outside money and partisan get-out-the-vote (GOTV) efforts; and,
- 15 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus assembled,
- 16 demands that the Legislature immediately bring the resolution to amend the Wisconsin
- 17 Constitution (to ban the use of private funds in Wisconsin's elections) to the floor for a second
- vote, and pass it so that it appears on the ballot in the next statewide election (now April 2024) for
- 19 consideration by the voters of Wisconsin.

#### 2023 - 13 MOVE THE AUGUST PRIMARY EARLIER

- 22 WHEREAS, the Republican Party of Wisconsin agrees that an extended primary drains resources
- from the eventual victor that could otherwise be committed to the actual campaign, and
- 24 WHEREAS, the Republican Party of Wisconsin believes that lining up behind the primary winner
- as early as possible will help that candidate win the election, and
- 26 WHEREAS, the Republican Party of Wisconsin also believes that the primary is a critically
- 27 important part of the process, whereby members and constituents can vet their candidates and
- support the ones they believe most represents their values, and
- 29 WHEREAS, the Republican Party of Wisconsin rejects the option backed by others, where
- 30 primary candidates would be expected to drop out if they did not win the endorsement at the State
- 31 GOP's convention, effectively short-circuiting the benefits described above, and
- WHEREAS, the problem could be solved in single stroke by having an earlier primary, and
- WHEREAS, numerous states have primaries that are much earlier, and therefore proving it can
- 34 be done, and
- WHEREAS, the timing of the primary is determined by legislation,

#### 2023 – 16 PROTECTING FREE SPEECH ON SOCIAL MEDIA

- WHEREAS, there are over 94,000,000 Social Media users in the United States of America, and
- over 650,000,000 users Worldwide. During the Hunter Biden Laptop story and 2018 Election it
- was identified that around 441,000 posts were either blocked or censored due to being deemed to
- 31 contain have 'mis information,
- 32 WHEREAS, two of the leaders in social media have a strong focus on advertisement contracts;
- Facebook holds over 37,000 and Twitter has just under 4,000 advertisement contracts,
- 34 WHEREAS, One Quarter of Americans (U.S. Citizens) use Twitter and 75,000,000 You Tube
- 35 users utilize Twitter for Income.
- 36 WHEREAS, the recently released Twitter Files Demonstrated that 'Certain' Government
- 37 'Employees' were able to stifle Free Speech Rights of Americans. Former FBI lawyer James
- 38 Baker's role became exceptionally good in cracking down on The Post's reporting while he worked
- 39 as Twitter's Deputy General Counsel, (a job from which Musk fired him). Twitter files further

- 1 revealed that Twitter's former head of trust and safety, Joel Roth, was contacted by FBI Agent
- 2 Elvis Chan just hours before The Post published the first laptop story on Oct. 14, 2020.
- 3 WHEREAS, Social media companies are collaborating with the Department of Homeland
- 4 Security's (DHS) initiative against online misinformation and disinformation, "according to a
- 5 report ...revealing a special portal hosted by Facebook for government officials to report
- 6 misinformation and disinformation." Though much of the DHS initiative to address disinformation
- 7 remains unknown to the American public, the goals became more visible with the creation of the
- 8 Disinformation Governance Board in early 2022, which had the stated goal of "safeguarding the
- 9 United States against threats" caused by false information on matters of national security, largely
- posted on social sites like Facebook and Twitter. A DHS statement regarding the program, which
- was paused just months after it was announced following extreme backlash from critics.
- 12 Investigative reporting found, through reviewing internal DHS memos, meeting minutes and
- 13 litigation published between 2018 and 2022, that the organization continued its work after the
- disbanding of the board. Targeting information posted on social media that it deemed to be
- 15 "inaccurate" about "the origins of the COVID-19 pandemic and the efficacy of COVID-19
- 16 vaccines, racial justice, US withdrawal from Afghanistan, and the nature of US support to
- 17 Ukraine".
- 18 WHEREAS, many Individuals had their Social Media accounts mined for data, knowingly and
- unknowingly by these companies. Where accounts are suspended, and information not allowed to
- be shared. Where many of these media decisions are not made in the open, with little information
- 21 on why these decisions are made, including algorithms, and definitions.
- 22 NOW THERE OF BE IT RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
- 23 assembled supports legislation that would prohibit governmental entities from coercing or

- charged to the state during their absence; and, anyone found to be willfully preventing a quorum,
- be immediately expelled from the current legislative body and a special election held to replace
- 26 them; and,
- 27 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that said legislator will have a recorded vote in the negative for
- 28 the legislation they were trying to block; and,
- 29 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that said legislator(s) guilty of leaving the state for the purposes
- 30 of blocking legislation or preventing a quorum, be prevented from being elected to any public
- 31 office in the future.

#### 2023 - 26 FIBER OPTICS PRIORITY

- 34 WHEREAS, Tom Wheeler, former FCC Chairman, and past promoter of 5G, has called for a
- 35 "fiber first" policy, and wireless "only as a last resort," stating that fiber is future-proof with a
- 36 lifespan up to 50 years, compared up to 5 years with wireless; and,
- 37 WHEREAS, wired fiber optic broadband is superior, in transmission speed, offering symmetrical
- download and upload speeds of at least 100 mbps, quality, reliability, privacy, cyber security,
- environmental safety, fire safety, health impacts, open-space aesthetics, long-term use of precious
- 40 resources, and affordability; and,

- 1 WHEREAS, Wisconsin monies were collected expressly for superior fiber optic broadband from
- 2 customers, and federal monies are available for fiber optic broadband connections rather than
- 3 expensive, unregulated, slow, unreliable, fluctuating quality, privacy-unsafe, easily cyber-
- 4 attackable, and hazardous wireless broadband, rapidly using up precious resources being replaced
- 5 every 5 years; therefore,
- 6 **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled hereby calls
- 7 upon the Wisconsin State Legislature and the Governor to earmark Wisconsin monies collected
- 8 expressly for superior fiber optic broadband connections and protect it from being spent on
- 9 wireless projects it wasn't collected for, and to prohibit federal broadband funding from being
- appropriated for fiber optic networks.

#### 2023 – 27 STOPPING FOREIGN PURCHASE OF US PROPERTY & RESOURCES

- WHEREAS, it is a matter of state and national security when any large American brand is owned
- or partially owned by the Chinese or other foreign investors because they have greater
- responsibilities in their homelands; and,
- WHEREAS, Chinese investors bought \$6.1 billion worth of property in the US between April
- 17 2021 and April 2022 as reported by The National Association Realtors (NAR); and,
- 18 WHEREAS, many Republicans have sounded the alarm on China buying up farmland located
- 19 near U.S. military bases which could allow potential foreign espionage and resource development;
- 20 and
- 21 WHEREAS, Senator Tom Cotton, R-AR, has estimated that between 2010 and 2020, China
- increased its agricultural land holding by nearly 2,500% to encompass over 350,000 acres of
- 23 American soil; and,
- 24 WHEREAS, there are six states that already have laws banning foreign ownership of farmland
- 25 (i.e.: Hawaii, Iowa, Minnesota, Mississippi, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Missouri, and Ohio) and
- 26 there are another eight states considering implementation of limits on foreign control of
- 27 agricultural land (i.e.: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Indiana, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee,
- and Texas), with California having passed a law, which was later vetoed; and
- 29 WHEREAS, South Dakota's Governor Kristi Noem (R) is clamping down on China yet again
- after signing an executive order to effectively ban state government contracts with six nations,
- 31 including China; and
- 32 **WHEREAS**, over the last 20 years, foreign companies have purchased more than 250,000 acres
- 33 of land in six Southwestern states to raise cattle and pigs, as well as to grow everything from
- almonds to alfalfa, according to an analysis of purchase data obtained from the US Department of
- 35 Agriculture; and,
- 36 WHEREAS, foreign corporations are increasingly purchasing land in the Southwest United
- 37 States, and thanks to longstanding laws on water rights, these purchases often come with unlimited
- access to the valuable water underneath the soil; and,
- 39 WHEREAS, bolstering American agriculture creates jobs, strengthens our economy, and
- 40 enhances our national supply chain into the future, thus we should be taking every action possible

- 1 to strengthen our domestic production, while preventing our adversaries from gaining a foothold
- 2 in our supply chain; and,
- 3 WHEREAS, this economic takeover of precious United States' assets is a threat to the security
- 4 and safety of our nation, the states, and all citizens,
- 5 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus
- 6 assembled, that no foreign country, non-US citizen, corporation, or entity may buy or own a
- business, land, water rights or power grids located in the State of Wisconsin or the rest of the
- 8 United States or its territories.

#### 2023 - 28 WORKFORCE EXPANSION

- 11 WHEREAS, employers in Wisconsin are desperate to fill vacant jobs, and the lack of willing
- workers is a true crisis; and,
- 13 WHEREAS, the structure of government benefits in Wisconsin does not help people reach
- independence, but instead keeps them enrolled in benefit programs.
- 15 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Republican of Wisconsin, supports
- legislation to: index unemployment duration to the unemployment rate, institute Food Share work
- 17 requirements, require more frequent reevaluation of unemployment compensation eligibility, and
- provide for an unemployment system tune-up that requires all able-bodied persons that request
- 19 taxpayer support through social programs must reside in the State of Wisconsin for 30 days, be
