6 **2023 - 01 COMMENDATION OF SENATOR RON JOHNSON**

7 **WHEREAS**, since being elected in 2010, Senator Ron Johnson has been a vocal leader in defense
8 of conservative principles, in providing government oversight, fighting for small business owners,
9 finding consensus on healthcare and opioid-abuse issues, improving border security and national
10 security in general, and highlighting our long-term fiscal concerns; and,

11 **WHEREAS**, Senator Johnson has taken up the mantle of investigating numerous topics of interest
12 to the American people, including the safety and efficacy of Covid-19 vaccines, or lack thereof,
13 and the benefits of alternative treatments, when others in Congress, the administration, and the
14 media have failed to do so; and,

15 **WHEREAS**, Senator Johnson has committed to and been elected to a third term; and,

16 **WHEREAS**, Senator Johnson shares our conservative principles and is working to protect our
17 interests and the interests of future generations;

18 **THEREFORE**, the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus assembled, thanks Senator Ron
19 Johnson for his commitment to our values and commends him for his determination and service to
20 the people of the state of Wisconsin and the United States of America.

22 **EDUCATION**

23
24 **2023 – 02 EDUCATION: SCHOOL FUNDING TO FOLLOW THE STUDENT**

25 **WHEREAS**, funding for “Choice Students” is just over \$8,000 per student vs near \$15,000 for
26 public school students; and,

27 **WHEREAS**, there is a significant variance in the performance of government schools, with some
28 performing with excellence and others performing poorly; and,

29 **WHEREAS**, Democrats and teachers’ unions continue to fight against the ability of parents to
30 utilize designated funds to provide a quality education for their children or to move their children
31 to different public schools from those designated based on residential location; and,

32 **WHEREAS**, private schools and homeschools often provide superior educational opportunities
33 for less than the cost of public schools, and the movement of students from public to private or
34 homeschooling may result in a net savings to taxpayers while improving outcomes.

35 **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in Caucus,
36 demands that elected leaders cease forcing our students into failing schools and may directly
37 allocate funds to students to cover expenses of the education of the parents’ choice; be it public,
38 private, or homeschool.

1 **2023 - 03 CRITICAL RACE THEORY**

2 **WHEREAS**, Critical Race Theory, an academic discipline rooted in Marxism, falsely posits that
3 the United States is an institutionally racist nation, and that racism is ingrained in every aspect of
4 American society; and

5 **WHEREAS**, proponents of critical race theory believe that the solution to what they determine to
6 be “institutional racism” in the United States is to dismantle and recreate all American institutions;
7 and

8 **WHEREAS**, Critical Race Theory’s tenets are fundamentally racist in that they suggest that
9 people should be viewed and treated differently based on the color of their skin; and

10 **WHEREAS**, Critical Race Theory divides Americans and promotes racial tensions and is
11 becoming increasingly prevalent in schools across the country.

12 **THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that The Republican Party of Wisconsin in Caucus
13 assembled, urges support for banning Critical Race Theory teaching and practice from future
14 educational models in Wisconsin schools.

15

16 **2023 - 04 DRAG IN SCHOOLS OR LIBRARIES**

17 **WHEREAS**, the purpose of our society's schools and libraries is to offer them learning
18 opportunities and to teach the basics like reading, writing, math, and sciences to our children to
19 help them become productive members of our society; and,

20 **WHEREAS**, from the beginning of time, parents alone have chosen what ethics and morals to
21 teach their kids; and,

22 **WHEREAS**, the purpose of such readings is to convince small children to accept the behavior of
23 people whose lifestyles are counter intuitive to the morals and ethics of their parents and the
24 majority; and,

25 **WHEREAS**, such behavior by these adults is considered grooming behavior; and,

26 **WHEREAS**, the way to include the LGBTQ community in our society has nothing to do with
27 giving them access to grooming society's children,

28 **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
29 assembled, demands Wisconsin's State Legislators and Legislative leaders, work together to pass
30 legislation to prevent outside people or groups from providing “readers,” or also Drag Queens
31 whose morals deviate from the public at large; and,

32 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that any publicly funded agency or organization who ignores
33 such legislation does so at the threat of loss of public funding; and,

34

35 **2023 - 05 RESOLUTION ON REDUCING SEXUALIZING YOUNG CHILDREN IN**
36 **PUBLIC SCHOOLS**

37 **WHEREAS**, it has been increasingly doubtful that public schools can properly police Sexual
38 Predators within their ranks, and that increasingly individuals within the system foster sexual
39 discourse to kindergarten, and 1st through 4th grade Students to influence their decision making.

1 **WHEREAS**, Florida’s Parental Rights in Education legislation, which prohibits public schools
2 from teaching gender identity and sexual orientation in kindergarten through third grade was
3 recently passed.

4 **WHEREAS**, A 2004 report from the U.S. Department of Education estimated that around one in
5 ten public school students will experience educator sexual misconduct by the time they graduate
6 from high school. The Department of Education should update the report as soon as possible to
7 allow current data to be analyzed.

8 **WHEREAS**, A “2000 survey, conducted by the American Association of University Women, of
9 2,065 students in grades 8 through 11 (showed)—that nearly 10 percent of K-12 students have
10 been victims of sexual misconduct by a Public-School employee. Assuming that figure is accurate,
11 this would translate into an approximately 4.5 million children nationwide suffering sexual
12 misconduct by public school employees, with an estimated 3 million suffering physical sexual
13 abuse, a number, according to the author of the study, (a) Hofstra University professor.... more
14 than 100 times greater than the physical abuse committed by Catholic priests”.

15 **WHEREAS**, A separate study on sexual allegations was conducted on the third largest school
16 district in Chicago, with 400,00 public school students. “A shocking report released on Jan. 1 by
17 the Office of the Inspector General (OIG) at Chicago Public Schools received 447 allegations of
18 adult-on-student sexual misconduct in 2022, ranging from inappropriate touching to sexual abuse.”
19 A prevalent feature of these crimes is in the demonstrated in the length of ‘protection’ afforded
20 when these crimes occur. A physical education teacher sent pornographic videos of his genital area
21 to an 11th grade female student The student reported the incident to two other staff members within
22 days of the occurrence. However, the two staff members "made excuses for the teacher," according
23 to the report. "One of them said that the conduct was probably unintentional and that he did not
24 believe the teacher would sexually harass a student because he had a daughter of his own.". "The
25 other staff member blamed the student for wearing provocative clothing, implying that she brought
26 the problem on herself."

27 **WHEREAS**, Sexual Predators were protected by the Loudoun County Public School’s Board. The
28 investigation into the boards’ bungled response to two sexual assaults, “has so far led to two
29 indictments and the firing of schools Superintendent Scott Ziegler. But those were by no means
30 the only examples of sexual violence being mishandled in the county’s schools.

31 **WHEREAS**, in another study of the Chicago School District a conclusion that these crimes go
32 under reported. “That According to the Office of Inspector General report stated that many of the
33 470 sexual misconduct cases it opened in 2022 "would not be addressed at all in other school
34 districts, or would be triaged to school staff or administrators, The report cites several examples of
35 sexual misconduct cases in 2022. There were 81 allegations classified as "touching, less than
36 sexual abuse"; 35 identified as "grooming"; 33 allegations labeled as "sexual abuse." There were
37 243 allegations labeled as "concerning." In its four years, the unit has opened 1,735 cases of sexual
38 misconduct.” The report stated at least 16 criminal charges have been filed against school-district
39 affiliated adults for sex-related crimes by prosecutors. An average of 4 prosecutions a year.

40 **NOW THERE OF BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
41 assembled fully supports implementation of laws protecting children from the ‘preparation’ of
42 Students toward sexuality below the 5th grade.

1 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled
2 urges that laws and funds be devoted to the identification and removal of sexual predators within
3 the Public-School Districts of Wisconsin by a force outside of the control of DPI and local school
4 boards, and prosecution of these crimes by local DA's made regularly. That Unions shall not be
5 permitted to negotiate or fund on behalf of those individuals that have been proven to be involved
6 in sexual misconduct with students.

7 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled
8 urges that the State of Wisconsin should participate in requiring applicants to disclose information
9 regarding investigations or disciplinary actions related to sexual abuse or misconduct, and in turn
10 make all allegations to be reported to the DPI to be tracked, and available to other States and
11 School Districts. Any proven history of sexual abuse should automatically disqualify one from
12 working in any institution where minor children are present.

13

14 **2023 - 06 PROTECTION OF FEMALE SPORTS**

15 **WHEREAS**, the purpose of women's or young ladies' sports programs are to offer a fun
16 environment for young ladies to learn about fair competition and the social and emotional benefits
17 of competing with those of their own biological gender, size, and class; and,

18 **WHEREAS**, from the beginning of sports programs, in general, there have been biological gender
19 specific, size and class differentiated sports programs, and such programs keep elementary school
20 football teams from having to compete with college football teams; and,

21 **WHEREAS**, it has never been the purpose of female sports to offer psychological aid to the
22 biological males who are the gender dysphoric among us as they deal with the unfortunate
23 condition, they find themselves in, and;

24 **WHEREAS**, publicly funded sports programs should not become ethical dumping grounds all in
25 the politically correct name of inclusion; and let us start including the wishes of the majority
26 participating in any female sports, and;

27 **WHEREAS**, there is nothing that precludes sports organizations who cater to people born
28 biological males from having or organizing and getting public funding for those programs catering
29 to biological males' sports.

30 **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
31 assembled, demands Wisconsin's State Legislators and Legislative leaders, work together to pass
32 legislation that prohibits any publicly funded organizations from allowing biological males from
33 participating in any female's sports programs, and denies public funding for any such
34 organizations; and,

35

36 **2023 - 07 PROTECT SCHOOLS – TRAIN/ARM TEACHERS**

37 **WHEREAS**, the state, parents and school personnel have a vested interest in the protection of
38 themselves and our children; and,

39 **WHEREAS**, our second amendment is specific about the right to bear arms not being infringed,
40 and makes no mention of a right of government to infringe on people's rights based on location;
41 and,

1 **WHEREAS**, it is a good idea to protect our children with teachers licensed for CCW, with firing
2 range time and training, recorded with and indemnified by the district; and,

3 **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
4 assembled, demands Wisconsin's State Legislators and Legislative leaders, work together to pass
5 legislation that reflects the teachers right to self-protection, affirming our desire to protect our
6 children and showing our resolve to have safe schools.

8 **2023 - 08 RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF PROTECTING FREEDOM OF**
9 **SPEECH, THOUGHT, AND EXPRESSION AT INSTITUTIONS OF**
10 **HIGHER EDUCATION**

11 **WHEREAS**, the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States guarantees that
12 “Congress shall make no law . . . abridging the freedom of speech”; and

13 **WHEREAS**, in *Healy v. James*, 408 U.S. 169 (1972), the Supreme Court of the United States held
14 that the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States applies in full force on the
15 campuses of public colleges and universities; and

16 **WHEREAS**, in *Widmar v. Vincent*, 454 U.S. 263 (1981), the Supreme Court of the United States
17 observed that “the campus of a public university, at least for its students, possesses many of the
18 characteristics of a public forum”; and

19 **WHEREAS**, lower Federal courts have also held that the open, outdoor areas of the campuses of
20 public colleges and universities are public forums; and

21 **WHEREAS**, section 112(a)(2) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1011a(a)(2))
22 contains a sense of Congress noting that “an institution of higher education should facilitate the
23 free and open exchange of ideas”, “students should not be intimidated, harassed, discouraged from
24 speaking out, or discriminated against”, “students should be treated equally and fairly”, and
25 “nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to modify, change, or infringe upon any
26 constitutionally protected religious liberty, freedom, expression, or association”; and

27 **WHEREAS**, despite the clarity of the applicable legal precedent and the vital importance of
28 protecting public colleges in the United States as true “marketplaces of ideas”, the Foundation for
29 Individual Rights in Education has found that approximately 1 in 10 of the top colleges and
30 universities in the United States quarantine student expression to so-called “free speech zones”,
31 and a survey of 466 schools found that almost 30 percent maintain severely restrictive speech
32 codes that clearly and substantially prohibit constitutionally protected speech; and

33 **WHEREAS**, according to the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), “Speech codes adopted
34 by government-financed state colleges and universities amount to government censorship, in
35 violation of the Constitution. And the ACLU believes that all campuses should adhere to First
36 Amendment principles because academic freedom is a bedrock of education in a free society.”;
37 and

38 **WHEREAS**, the University of Chicago, as part of its commitment “to free and open inquiry in all
39 matters”, in 2015 issued a statement in which “it guarantees all members of the University
40 community the broadest possible latitude to speak, write, listen, challenge, and learn”, and 78
41 university administrations and faculty bodies (including the University of Wisconsin System, when

1 in October, 2017 the Board of Regents adopted Regent Policy Document 4-21) have endorsed a
2 version of the “Chicago Statement”; and

3 **WHEREAS**, the States of Virginia, Missouri, Arizona, Kentucky, Colorado, Utah, North Carolina,
4 Tennessee, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, South Dakota, and Iowa (and others) have passed
5 legislation prohibiting public colleges and universities from quarantining expressive activities on
6 the open outdoor areas of campuses to misleadingly labeled free speech zones; and

7 **WHEREAS**, free speech zones have been used to restrict political speech from all parts of the
8 political spectrum and have thus inhibited the free exchange of ideas at campuses across the
9 country; and

10 **WHEREAS**, restrictions on the free exchange of ideas and opinions on Wisconsin college
11 campuses diminish the ability of students to develop critical thinking skills that are the primary
12 goals of higher education, thus devaluing the quality of education underwritten by Wisconsin
13 taxpayers and tuition payers; now, therefore, be it

14 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin District, in caucus assembled, recognizes
15 that free speech zones and restrictive speech codes are inherently at odds with the freedom of
16 speech guaranteed by the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; and be it
17 further,

18 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, recognizes that
19 institutions of higher education should facilitate and recommit themselves to protecting the free
20 and open exchange of ideas; and be it further,

21 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin District Recognizes that freedom of
22 expression and freedom of speech are sacred ideals of the United States that must be vigorously
23 safeguarded in a world increasingly hostile to our Republic; and be it further,

24 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, encourages the
25 Wisconsin State legislature to adopt legislation like that in other States, prohibiting Wisconsin
26 public colleges and universities from quarantining expressive activities on the open outdoor areas
27 of campuses to misleadingly labeled free speech zones; and be it further,

28 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, encourages the
29 President of the University of Wisconsin (UW) System to enforce the action items already
30 specified in Regent Policy Document 4-21 (Commitment to Academic Freedom and Freedom of
31 Expression), and to promote policies that foster spirited debate, academic freedom, intellectual
32 curiosity, and viewpoint diversity on the campuses of the UW System; and be it further,

33 **RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, recognizes that many
34 of the restrictions of free speech on UW System campuses result directly from a lack of intellectual
35 and/or viewpoint diversity among faculty and administrators, and therefore encourages the
36 President of the UW System to appoint a commission to inquire into that lack and its impact on
37 the quality of education at UW System institutions; and now, therefore,

38 **BE IT RESOLVED** that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, encourages the
39 Wisconsin Attorney General to defend and protect the First Amendment on Wisconsin colleges
40 and Universities.

1 **ELECTIONS**

2
3 **2023 - 09 SECURE OUR ELECTIONS**

4 **WHEREAS**, Democrat controlled federal agencies such as the FBI have colluded with US based
5 international tech companies to interfere in our elections, and

6 **WHEREAS**, managing elections is a state responsibility, not a federal responsibility, and

7 **WHEREAS**, the findings of both the Gableman and Legislative Audit Bureau investigations of
8 the 2020 election have raised serious doubts about the integrity of Wisconsin's elections, and

9 **WHEREAS**, The Democrat Party has been using outside money to administer elections and to
10 engage in ballot harvesting in counties that it controls, and

11 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin's most populous Democrat governed counties and municipalities refuse
12 to enforce election law, leaving their jurisdictions rife with illegal vote harvesting and voter
13 registration fraud, and

14 **WHEREAS**, counties and municipalities that are unable to control crime, from homicide to
15 shoplifting, lack both the will and the means to stop illegal vote harvesting, and

16 **NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus
17 assembled:

- 18 1. calls the Wisconsin legislature to formally censure the federal administration for violating
19 Wisconsin sovereignty by interfering in its elections, and
- 20 2. declares that the only way to restore faith in our elections in the face of so many well-
21 financed, creative vote harvesting operations is to return to same-day, in-person voting with
22 the only exceptions being absentee ballots issued only for cause, and
- 23 3. calls the WEC to require those now termed "indefinitely confined" to simply use the
24 absentee ballot procedure, and
- 25 4. calls on the State Legislature to outlaw outside funding to counties and municipalities" for
26 election administration and staffing and,
- 27 5. calls on our counties to continue to use paper ballots counted by simple voting tabulators
28 with no Wi-Fi modems or internet capability, or requests that voting machines be
29 eliminated and all ballots be counted by hand, and
- 30 6. calls on municipal clerks to delete voter registrations of all inactive voters every four years,
31 and
- 32 7. calls on the state registrar's office to automatically update voter registration rolls whenever
33 it receives death certificate notification, and
- 34 8. calls on County District Attorneys who have jurisdiction to prosecute election fraud in
35 adjoining counties, and
- 36 9. calls on the legislative leadership of the Assembly to articulate and implement a plan to
37 use its considerable power of the purse to encourage all municipalities to enforce election
38 law.

1 **2023 - 10 ELIMINATION OF WEC AND E.R.I.C.**

2 **WHEREAS**, free and fair elections are the cornerstone of the American Republic; and,
3 **WHEREAS**, since the 2020 Spring election (and before), election laws of Wisconsin were allowed
4 to be violated by directives of the Commissioners of the Wisconsin Elections Commission (WEC);
5 and,

6 **WHEREAS**, WEC also directed certain counties to use illegal drop boxes for ballots, promoted
7 improper registration requirements for absentee ballots, and allowed ballot harvesting; which were
8 all prohibited by Wisconsin law; and,

9 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin has experienced the WEC involvement in our elections since June 30,
10 2016, and the inclusion of the Electronic Registration Information Center (E.R.I.C.) since 2012,
11 and whereas we believe that both systems have not been beneficial to the citizens of Wisconsin;
12 and,

13 **WHEREAS**, it appears that another layer of bureaucracy has been placed between the citizens and
14 their government by the establishment of the WEC; and,

15 **WHEREAS**, easy access to our voter information, as well as our private DL# and SS#, by
16 unknown actors has been documented to have occurred due to Wisconsin's having joined the
17 E.R.I.C., and,

18 **NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
19 assembled, hereby calls upon the Governor and Wisconsin's State Assembly and Senate to
20 eliminate the WEC, dissolve any contract with E.R.I.C., investigate the use of alternative service
21 such as Omega4America; and,

22 **BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, the Republican Party of Wisconsin requires the state legislature
23 resume their rightful and constitutional duties to certify electors, as identified in Wisconsin law
24 and the U.S. Constitution Article II, section 4, clause 1, and that they never again delegate their
25 full authority to administrate elections as required by law to another organizational entity.

26

27 **2023 - 11 WISCONSIN ELECTION ADMINISTRATION**

28 **WHEREAS**, millions of dollars in private funds have been donated to Wisconsin municipalities
29 by Center for Tech and Civic Life (CTCL) and other private groups since 2020, for the purpose of
30 manipulating the outcome of Wisconsin election administration; and,

31 **WHEREAS**, according to the reports issued by the Gableman investigation and the Assembly
32 Elections Committee hearings, the infusion of private money into Wisconsin elections has changed
33 the outcome of these elections; and,

34 **WHEREAS**, the City of Madison again this year accepted an additional \$1.5 million dollars in
35 private funding to administer elections, and the City of Milwaukee, other Wisconsin cities and the
36 Wisconsin University System have accepted or are currently considering approval of similar
37 donations; and,

38 **WHEREAS**, the Governor has vetoed legislation banning the use of private funds in the
39 administration of Wisconsin's elections; and,

1 **WHEREAS**, the Wisconsin Constitution can be amended without the Governor’s signature by
2 both the Assembly and Senate passing a resolution in two consecutive sessions and then putting
3 the resolution on the ballot for the people of Wisconsin to approve; and,

4 **WHEREAS**, in the last legislative session, the Wisconsin Assembly and the Wisconsin Senate
5 passed a resolution to amend the Wisconsin Constitution to ban the use of private funds in
6 Wisconsin’s elections; and,

7 **WHEREAS**, this resolution was not re-introduced in the initial 2023 Legislative session, meaning
8 it would not appear on the April ballot; and,

9 **WHEREAS**, a recent grassroots survey of Republican voters showed over 85% would vote in
10 favor of said constitutional amendment;

11 **THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus
12 assembled, demands that the State Legislature protect our constitutional right to have our
13 individual votes fully and properly counted in every election and ban the illegal influence of
14 outside money and partisan get-out-the-vote (GOTV) efforts; and,

15 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus assembled,
16 demands that the Legislature immediately bring the resolution to amend the Wisconsin
17 Constitution (to ban the use of private funds in Wisconsin’s elections) to the floor for a second
18 vote, and pass it so that it appears on the ballot in the next statewide election (now April 2024) for
19 consideration by the voters of Wisconsin.

20

21 **2023 - 13 MOVE THE AUGUST PRIMARY EARLIER**

22 **WHEREAS**, the Republican Party of Wisconsin agrees that an extended primary drains resources
23 from the eventual victor that could otherwise be committed to the actual campaign, and

24 **WHEREAS**, the Republican Party of Wisconsin believes that lining up behind the primary winner
25 as early as possible will help that candidate win the election, and

26 **WHEREAS**, the Republican Party of Wisconsin also believes that the primary is a critically
27 important part of the process, whereby members and constituents can vet their candidates and
28 support the ones they believe most represents their values, and

29 **WHEREAS**, the Republican Party of Wisconsin rejects the option backed by others, where
30 primary candidates would be expected to drop out if they did not win the endorsement at the State
31 GOP’s convention, effectively short-circuiting the benefits described above, and

32 **WHEREAS**, the problem could be solved in single stroke by having an earlier primary, and

33 **WHEREAS**, numerous states have primaries that are much earlier, and therefore proving it can
34 be done, and

35 **WHEREAS**, the timing of the primary is determined by legislation,

36 **THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Republican Party of Wisconsin calls upon its own
37 legislators which currently holds both the assembly and the senate, to move the primaries earlier.

FEDERAL ISSUES

2023 - 14 IMMIGRATION POLICY

WHEREAS, current laws and the lack of their enforcement have not succeeded in preventing the movement of illegal individuals across our borders; and,

WHEREAS, this situation has resulted in unsecured borders, opportunities for terrorist, criminals, and a large underground economy that is reliant on the labor of illegal individuals; and,

WHEREAS, illegal immigration is defined as someone who has violated federal and/or state laws in gaining access and remaining in the United States; and,

WHEREAS, an amnesty program is counterproductive to upholding America’s law, and rewards illegal activity at the expense of the many who abide by the law and gain legal entry into the United States, and encourages continued illegal immigration; and,

WHEREAS, illegal immigration not only creates social, economic, health, and educational problems, but also threatens our state and national security.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled, insists that Congress exercise oversight and require the executive branch to enforce existing laws to secure our borders from illegal immigration and eliminate the courts’ ability to delay deportation proceedings; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Republican Party of Wisconsin opposes an amnesty program of illegal individuals, and urges that any locality which refuses to allow enforcement of immigration law, declaring themselves to be a “Sanctuary City or State,” must be denied all federal and/or state funding; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Republican Party of Wisconsin supports legislation requiring state and local law enforcement to cooperate with immigration officials in deporting illegal aliens; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Republican Party of Wisconsin supports a moratorium on the admittance of refugees until they can be fully vetted and believes that the countries in the region have the first responsibility to accept these refugees and create safe zones; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in Caucus assembled, urges the Federal government to resume construction of a border wall; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in Caucus assembled, urges our representatives in Washington to oppose unconditional amnesty for illegal immigrants.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin rejects the errant interpretation of the Fourteenth Amendment known as “birthright citizenship” for children of illegal immigrants, aliens, and non- citizens.

2023 - 15 SECURE THE BORDERS

2 **WHEREAS**, we welcome legal immigration that has kept the American dream alive, and

3 **WHEREAS**, illegal immigration is destroying that dream by overwhelming our social safety nets
4 and creating more crime, more vote fraud, more homelessness, and more societal chaos, and

5 **WHEREAS**, the Biden administration has refused to secure our borders; has enabled the
6 smuggling of fentanyl and other illegal drugs; and is actively engaged in human trafficking by
7 transporting illegal aliens into our cities often under cover of darkness and with the silence of a
8 complicit press.

9 **RESOLVED** that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus assembled,

10 1. calls on Congress to either order President Biden to complete the border wall or empower
11 border states to do so, and

12 2. calls on the Wisconsin State Legislature to demand that the Governor send the Wisconsin
13 National Guard to aid the national guards of southern border states in defending their, and

23 Congress to support current laws in place such as Remain in Mexico, returning illegal aliens across
24 the border, extending Title 42 or any other laws and regulations that will stop the illegal entry of
25 aliens into our country.

27 **2023 – 16 PROTECTING FREE SPEECH ON SOCIAL MEDIA**

28 **WHEREAS**, there are over 94,000,000 Social Media users in the United States of America, and
29 over 650,000,000 users Worldwide. During the Hunter Biden Laptop story and 2018 Election it
30 was identified that around 441,000 posts were either blocked or censored due to being deemed to
31 contain have ‘mis information,

32 **WHEREAS**, two of the leaders in social media have a strong focus on advertisement contracts;
33 Facebook holds over 37,000 and Twitter has just under 4,000 advertisement contracts,

34 **WHEREAS**, One Quarter of Americans (U.S. Citizens) use Twitter and 75,000,000 You Tube
35 users utilize Twitter for Income.

36 **WHEREAS**, the recently released Twitter Files Demonstrated that ‘Certain’ Government
37 ‘Employees’ were able to stifle Free Speech Rights of Americans. Former FBI lawyer James
38 Baker’s role became exceptionally good in cracking down on The Post’s reporting while he worked
39 as Twitter’s Deputy General Counsel, (a job from which Musk fired him). Twitter files further

1 revealed that Twitter’s former head of trust and safety, Joel Roth, was contacted by FBI Agent
2 Elvis Chan just hours before The Post published the first laptop story on Oct. 14, 2020.

3 **WHEREAS**, Social media companies are collaborating with the Department of Homeland
4 Security's (DHS) initiative against online misinformation and disinformation, “according to a
5 report ...revealing a special portal hosted by Facebook for government officials to report
6 misinformation and disinformation.” Though much of the DHS initiative to address disinformation
7 remains unknown to the American public, the goals became more visible with the creation of the
8 Disinformation Governance Board in early 2022, which had the stated goal of "safeguarding the
9 United States against threats" caused by false information on matters of national security, largely
10 posted on social sites like Facebook and Twitter. A DHS statement regarding the program, which
11 was paused just months after it was announced following extreme backlash from critics.
12 Investigative reporting found, through reviewing internal DHS memos, meeting minutes and
13 litigation published between 2018 and 2022, that the organization continued its work after the
14 disbanding of the board. Targeting information posted on social media that it deemed to be
15 "inaccurate" about "the origins of the COVID-19 pandemic and the efficacy of COVID-19
16 vaccines, racial justice, US withdrawal from Afghanistan, and the nature of US support to
17 Ukraine".

18 **WHEREAS**, many Individuals had their Social Media accounts mined for data, knowingly and
19 unknowingly by these companies. Where accounts are suspended, and information not allowed to
20 be shared. Where many of these media decisions are not made in the open, with little information
21 on why these decisions are made, including algorithms, and definitions.

22 **NOW THERE OF BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
23 assembled supports legislation that would prohibit governmental entities from coercing or
24 colluding with publicly and privately held companies to suppress or censor social media posts.

26 **HEALTHCARE**

27

28 **2023 - 17 MEDICAL HEALTH FREEDOM**

29 **WHEREAS** the doctor-patient relationship should be inviolable; and

30 **WHEREAS** decisions to use any medical devices or pursue any medical or pharmaceutical
31 intervention should remain a matter of personal choice, with fully informed consent; and

32 **WHEREAS** both public and private entities leveraged the COVID-19 pandemic both to interfere
33 in the sanctity of the doctor-patient relationship and to manipulate and coerce individuals as to
34 specific behaviors, interventions, and pharmaceuticals, many of which have proven either
35 deleterious or deadly; and

36 **WHEREAS** such entities similarly worked not only to limit information concerning other proven
37 interventions but also to curtail crucial access to them; and

38 **WHEREAS** hospitals and clinics across this state were incentivized to participate in this
39 manipulation and coercion, thereby endangering not only the lives and livelihoods of individual
40 citizens but also the workings of a free society; now...

41 **BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED** that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
42 assembled, calls upon the Wisconsin State Legislature to draft an amendment to our State

1 Constitution, guaranteeing that medical freedoms shall not be infringed by any public or private
2 entity, and that these freedoms include the sanctity of the doctor- patient relationship, informed
3 consent, and choice or denial of medical or pharmaceutical interventions; and

4

5 **2023 - 18 ADDRESSING GENDER DYSPHORIA IN MINORS**

6 **WHEREAS**, vulnerable minors do not have the maturity to give informed consent for physical
7 treatments of gender dysphoria, including medications to delay puberty cross-sex hormones or
8 surgery to feminize or masculinize the body; and,

9 **WHEREAS**, education standards increasingly address, if not encourage, gender dysphoria and
10 gender transition; and,

11 **WHEREAS**, legislation is needed to preserve women’s sports and protect girls and women from
12 competing against transgender athletes, since hormone treatments cannot undo the effect of male
13 stature or male chromosomes on the performance of competitive athletes, and athletic
14 opportunities for transgender students can be provided by coed leagues; and,

15 **WHEREAS**, psycho-social treatments of gender dysphoria encouraging acceptance of
16 chromosomal gender are often successful, efforts to outlaw such treatments notwithstanding.

17 **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus
18 strongly encourages legislation banning physical treatments of gender dysphoria in minors, and
19 allowing a minor the right to recover damages against parents, medical staff, or other third parties
20 at any future date; and,

21 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus encourages
22 the local school boards to be vigilant and transparent regarding gender dysphoria and transgender
23 issues, so as not to encourage minors to aspire to transformations that may be harmful in maturity;
24 and,

25 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus urges that
26 legislation to preserve women’s and girls’ sports for biological females be enacted; therefore,
27 athletes must be recognized by their biological gender at birth regardless of their perceived sexual
28 identity; and,

29 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus endorses
30 legislation that permits psychological treatment of gender dysphoria; and,

31 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus recognizes
32 that since cultural changes can progress extremely rapidly, this issue needs to be addressed now,
33 before physical treatments become widespread and accepted.

34

35 **2023 - 19 END VACCINE MANDATES**

36 **WHEREAS**, according to the CDC’s own VAER’s website, the mRNA shots, which have been
37 wrongly presented and promoted to the public as “safe and effective vaccines,” have documented
38 around 35,000 deaths in the United States which are believed to be caused by the shots; and

39 **WHEREAS**, a pre-pandemic Harvard study states that VAER’s website under-reports data by
40 approximately 90%, which would put the actual death toll at over 300,000 people; and

5 informed consent can be attained through the release of reliable and truthful data from our

7 **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus
8 assembled, demands that our legislature and governor work together in an emergency session to
9 end the administration of these lethal and injurious shots in the State of Wisconsin and end
10 government mandates coercing the administration of these shots; and

11 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus assembled,
12 demands that every coercive mandate by state and local officials in the State of Wisconsin
13 immediately cease requiring or encouraging the administration of these shots to the public, to
14 employees and to school children.

16 **2023 – 20 HOSPITALS MUST END COVID 19 PROTOCOLS /MAKE IVERMECTIM**
17 **AVAILABLE IVERMECTIN OTC**

18 **WHEREAS**, Ivermectin is a safe, Nobel-prizewinning drug that was approved by the FDA almost
19 40 years ago for human use and is currently used “off-label” in attempts to save Covid 19 patients
20 from death;

21 **WHEREAS**, the hospitals throughout the State of Wisconsin have intentionally withheld this
22 potentially life-saving treatment, in order to continue receiving Medicare/Medicaid
23 reimbursements via the federal government’s Covid 19 Protocols, while at the same time have
24 given many Covid 19 patient, Remdesivir, a dangerous and often lethal drug and in some cases,
25 even after patients or their Health care Power of Attorneys have refused the treatment;

26 **WHEREAS**, the hospitals get a 20% bonus from CMS (Medicare/Medicaid) on the overall patient
27 bill for giving Remdesivir;

28 **WHEREAS**, hospitals will have CMS reimbursements withheld if they give Ivermectin;

29 **WHEREAS**, our state legislators are under intense pressure lobbied by American Hospital
30 Association (AHA) and other groups that work closely with the federal government; and

31 **WHEREAS**, our Wisconsin DSPS is threatening the licenses of doctors and other legally licensed
32 prescribers for prescribing the legal, off-label use of Ivermectin; and

33 **WHEREAS**, the recent Omnibus Bill currently in Congress has a provision to give the FDA the
34 sole authority to ban all off-label uses of drugs (accounting for 20% of all prescriptions) which
35 would destroy and undermine the prescriptive authority granted by law and the decision-making
36 role of physicians, nurse practitioners and physician assistants.

37 **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus
38 assembled, demands that our legislators who have oversight and regulatory powers over hospital
39 licensing in the State of Wisconsin, demand that they immediately cause hospital administrations
40 to cease and desist their control of medical practices including imposition of lethal Covid 19
41 Protocols created by the federal government and that they through their oversight powers stop

1 DSPS from threatening prescribers' licenses for prescribing Ivermectin and any other off-label use
2 of medication for the purpose of saving lives; and

3 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus assembled,
4 demands that our legislators pass immediate legislation preventing financial pay-to-play incentives
5 or disincentives that would influence medical practice and medical decision-making and act to

8 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Republican Party of Wisconsin demands that our
9 legislators pass immediate legislation making Ivermectin an over-the-counter medication in the
10 State of Wisconsin, which would follow in the recent footsteps of the State of Tennessee.

11 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus assembled,
12 demands that our federal representatives vote against the "off-label" language in the Omnibus bill
13 currently before them.

14 **2023 – 21 LIMIT PUBLIC HEALTH ORGANIZATION AUTHORITY**

15 **WHEREAS** the right to liberty, as defined and guaranteed by the U.S. and Wisconsin
16 Constitutions, includes business ownership; and

17 **WHEREAS** the right to life and liberty, as similarly defined and guaranteed, includes the pursuit
18 of livelihood; and

19 **WHEREAS** public health authorities should have no power to infringe upon life or liberty, either
20 through false labels such as "non-essential," or nonsensical rules such as arbitrary capacity limits
21 and closures; and

22 **WHEREAS** public health agencies statewide, particularly Public Health Madison and Dane
23 County (PHMDC), leveraged the COVID pandemic to abuse the people's rights; and

24 **WHEREAS** numerous elected and appointed local officials violated their oaths of office by
25 abetting the PHMDC director in her issuance and enforcement of damaging, unconstitutional
26 emergency orders; and

27 **WHEREAS** the Wisconsin Supreme Court recently failed the people in Becker v. Dane County,
28 affirming the right of public health directors to function as de facto county rulers; now

31 only to clarify and further limit the authority of public health officers to issue orders but also to

33 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that a copy of this resolution shall be sent to all Republican state
34 legislators, who currently hold majorities in both chambers of the State Legislature.

36 **2023 - 22 SANCTITY OF HUMAN LIFE**

37 **WHEREAS**, our founding fathers recognized life as an inalienable, individual right which the
38 Republican Party has reaffirmed in declaring abortion, infanticide, and euthanasia to be violations
39 of this sacred and basic human right; and,

1 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin State 940.04(6) declares, “unborn child” means a human being from the
2 time of conception”; and,

3 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin Statute 940.01 (a) declares, “whoever causes the death of another human
4 being with intent to kill that person, or another is guilty of a Class A felony;” and,

5 **WHEREAS**, the unborn, the infirm, and the elderly are human beings entitled to the most basic
6 human right, the right to life; and,

7 **WHEREAS**, the United States Supreme Court Dobbs vs. Jackson overturned Roe vs. Wade
8 returning authority of local laws on abortion previously wrested from State and local governments,
9 an issue reserved to the States and the People by the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution of the
10 United States;

11 **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus
12 insists that our federal and state legislators reaffirm the sanctity of ALL human life and reestablish
13 legal protection of innocent human life from fertilization to natural death; and,

14 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the State of Wisconsin and local governments enforce
15 Wisconsin's 1849 Abortion Law which bans abortion everywhere in Wisconsin, including at the
16 University of Wisconsin and all its satellite locations; and,

17 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin demands that the selling
18 of baby body parts and/or fetal tissue, AND the research and/or use of embryonic stem cells and
19 aborted fetal tissue; be prohibited; and,

13
14 **2023 – 25 LEGISLATIVE DUTY & CONSEQUENCES FOR ABROGATION**

15 **WHEREAS**, in 2011, the duly elected state representatives in the Democratic party refused to do
16 the job the taxpayers paid them to do by departing the state to prevent the passage of legislation
17 known as Act 10;

18 **WHEREAS**, in 2021, the duly elected state representatives in the Democratic Party of Texas
19 departed the state of Texas to prevent the passage of legislation; now.

20 **THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus
21 assembled, demands Wisconsin's State Legislators and Legislative leaders, work together to pass

33 **2023 - 26 FIBER OPTICS PRIORITY**

34 **WHEREAS**, Tom Wheeler, former FCC Chairman, and past promoter of 5G, has called for a
35 “fiber first” policy, and wireless “only as a last resort,” stating that fiber is future-proof with a
36 lifespan up to 50 years, compared up to 5 years with wireless; and,

37 **WHEREAS**, wired fiber optic broadband is superior, in transmission speed, offering symmetrical
38 download and upload speeds of at least 100 mbps, quality, reliability, privacy, cyber security,
39 environmental safety, fire safety, health impacts, open-space aesthetics, long-term use of precious
40 resources, and affordability; and,

1 **WHEREAS**, Wisconsin monies were collected expressly for superior fiber optic broadband from
2 customers, and federal monies are available for fiber optic broadband connections rather than
3 expensive, unregulated, slow, unreliable, fluctuating quality, privacy-unsafe, easily cyber-
4 attackable, and hazardous wireless broadband, rapidly using up precious resources being replaced
5 every 5 years; therefore,

6 **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican Party of Wisconsin, in caucus assembled hereby calls
7 upon the Wisconsin State Legislature and the Governor to earmark Wisconsin monies collected
8 expressly for superior fiber optic broadband connections and protect it from being spent on
9 wireless projects it wasn't collected for, and to prohibit federal broadband funding from being
10 appropriated for fiber optic networks.

12 **2023 – 27 STOPPING FOREIGN PURCHASE OF US PROPERTY & RESOURCES**

13 **WHEREAS**, it is a matter of state and national security when any large American brand is owned
14 or partially owned by the Chinese or other foreign investors because they have greater
15 responsibilities in their homelands; and,

16 **WHEREAS**, Chinese investors bought \$6.1 billion worth of property in the US between April
17 2021 and April 2022 as reported by The National Association Realtors (NAR); and,

18 **WHEREAS**, many Republicans have sounded the alarm on China buying up farmland located
19 near U.S. military bases which could allow potential foreign espionage and resource development;
20 and,

21 **WHEREAS**, Senator Tom Cotton, R-AR, has estimated that between 2010 and 2020, China
22 increased its agricultural land holding by nearly 2,500% to encompass over 350,000 acres of
23 American soil; and,

24 **WHEREAS**, there are six states that already have laws banning foreign ownership of farmland
25 (i.e.: Hawaii, Iowa, Minnesota, Mississippi, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Missouri, and Ohio) and
26 there are another eight states considering implementation of limits on foreign control of
27 agricultural land (i.e.: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Indiana, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee,
28 and Texas), with California having passed a law, which was later vetoed; and

29 **WHEREAS**, South Dakota's Governor Kristi Noem (R) is clamping down on China yet again
30 after signing an executive order to effectively ban state government contracts with six nations,
31 including China; and

32 **WHEREAS**, over the last 20 years, foreign companies have purchased more than 250,000 acres
33 of land in six Southwestern states to raise cattle and pigs, as well as to grow everything from
34 almonds to alfalfa, according to an analysis of purchase data obtained from the US Department of
35 Agriculture; and,

36 **WHEREAS**, foreign corporations are increasingly purchasing land in the Southwest United
37 States, and thanks to longstanding laws on water rights, these purchases often come with unlimited
38 access to the valuable water underneath the soil; and,

39 **WHEREAS**, bolstering American agriculture creates jobs, strengthens our economy, and
40 enhances our national supply chain into the future, thus we should be taking every action possible

1 to strengthen our domestic production, while preventing our adversaries from gaining a foothold
2 in our supply chain; and,

3 **WHEREAS**, this economic takeover of precious United States' assets is a threat to the security
4 and safety of our nation, the states, and all citizens,

5 **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Republican Party of Wisconsin in caucus
6 assembled, that no foreign country, non-US citizen, corporation, or entity may buy or own a
7 business, land, water rights or power grids located in the State of Wisconsin or the rest of the
8 United States or its territories.

10 **2023 - 28 WORKFORCE EXPANSION**

11 **WHEREAS**, employers in Wisconsin are desperate to fill vacant jobs, and the lack of willing
12 workers is a true crisis; and,

13 **WHEREAS**, the structure of government benefits in Wisconsin does not help people reach
14 independence, but instead keeps them enrolled in benefit programs.

15 **NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Republican of Wisconsin, supports
16 legislation to: index unemployment duration to the unemployment rate, institute Food Share work
17 requirements, require more frequent reevaluation of unemployment compensation eligibility, and
18 provide for an unemployment system tune-up that requires all able-bodied persons that request
19 taxpayer support through social programs must reside in the State of Wisconsin for 30 days, be
20 required to apply for at least one job every week, provide proof of said job applications upon
21 request until gainfully employed for a minimum of 36 hours, and fulfill any other measures enacted
